Leslie Lambour Bouterie, an independent scholar, is a ceramic specialist and career educator. Life abroad and extensive travels exposed her to renowned collections of porcelain and pottery, fueling her passion for ceramics, especially those of British production.

While residing in the Washington, DC area, she worked in the field of museum education and interpretation and held positions at the National Museum of Women in the Arts, Hillwood Museum and Gardens, and with the National Trust for Historic Preservation at *President Lincoln's Cottage*.

Now living in Charlottesville, Virginia, she serves as the Visiting Curator of Ceramics at James Madison's *Montpelier* and as a Visiting Scholar for the Colonial Williamsburg Foundation. She is a volunteer for public engagement programs at Thomas Jefferson's *Monticello* and James Monroe's *Highland*, where she also works in the apiary as associate beekeeper.



Leslie currently serves on the board of the American Ceramic Circle. She served for many years as an executive board member of the Transferware Collectors Club, chaired several committees, and continues to serve as an editor for the TCC research database. As an independent scholar, she provides consultation and education services to museums and historic sites, writes articles for publication, and speaks at national and international conferences.
